#### FR. ERIC - RAMBLINGS

Reflections on Fatima 21 of 27

August 13 continued: More suffering...

Their captors were hoping that, being the youngest, she could be more easily intimidated. They were mistaken, however; questioning her on the way, they could not get her to say a single word. After questioning her, they put her into another room that seemed to belong to the prison.



Meanwhile, in the administrator's office, Lúcia and Francisco imagined that everything was taking place as they had been told. The guard came back, announced that Jacinta was already "fried" and took Francisco by the arm. The little boy wept bitterly as he left his cousin alone. The men threatened him that they would boil him too, just like Jacinta, if he did not reveal the secret. But he ignored this threat and kept silent. Lúcia, meanwhile, was waiting anxiously through all this, convinced that her cousins were dead. In spite of that, she did not utter a single word about the secret. Finally, they gave up and allowed her to join her cousins in the room. Surprised to find them alive, she embraced them joyfully. Each had faced an insuperable dilemma, in such a way that this trial could be called a martyrdom. The three children had been ready to give their lives rather than break their promise to Our Lady.

An official interrogation of Lúcia of Jesus that took place on July 8, 1924, the visionary of Fátima, with her usual accurate memory, related the details about what happened to the three children. "When we arrived at Ourém, they locked us into a room and said that we would not be allowed to leave it as long as we refused to tell the secret that the Lady had confided to us. The next day, an elderly lady questioned us about the secret, then brought us to the administration office, where we were interrogated again and offered gold pieces if we would reveal the secret. We went back to the administrator's house, where we had stayed the previous night, and in the afternoon, we were again questioned about the secret. On the 16th, we went again to the administration office about 10:00 a.m., but they could not get anything out of us, as had happened previously. Then the administrator ordered us to get into a car and brought us to the parish priest's house, leaving us on the veranda." The administrator tries more threats. Beaten, but unconvinced, the administrator used other threats, according to a reference in Sister Lúcia's memoirs: "One day, three gentlemen came to speak with us. After their interrogation, which was hardly pleasant, they left, saying: 'See that you decide to tell this secret; if not, the administrator is ready to stop you by taking your lives." Jacinta reacted to this threat with joy, saying that if it happened, it would only serve to allow them to see Our Lord and Our Lady that much sooner. Because of the threat, an aunt of Lúcia's who was married and lived in Casais tried to bring her niece to her home, since she lived outside the jurisdiction of the administrator. The little girl, however, refused to leave her own home. Lúcia refers to all these events without bitterness. When she was asked what she, or her cousins, thought of the administrator's strategies or of the jail, she answered quite simply: "My impression was that the administrator was simply the instrument that God used to let us suffer for love of him and for the conversion of poor sinners. I suppose my cousins' impressions were the same."

#### FIXING THE ROOF (HOPEFULLY)



Reflection on Matthew 10:26-33

Jesus' instructions to His disciples before going out on mission continue in today's Gospel, and notice how He tells them three different times: Do not be afraid. How often does fear hold us back from being the salt and light we are called to be, flavoring and enlightening the world with Gospel Truth?

Jesus knows that being His messenger will at times make us unpopular, and even bring pain and persecution. So, He reminds us, through these instructions, that the promise of His presence with us, the intimate love He has for each of us ("all the hairs of your head are counted"), are far more powerful than any resistance we encounter. We are to acknowledge God openly and unapologetically in our families, our workplaces, our communities. This assures our recognition, that our Father will acknowledge us when we come to our final judgment.

## **SAINT JUNIPERO SERRA**

Feast Day: July 1


Patron Saint of: California Missions

Born on Spain's island of Mallorca, Serra entered the Franciscan Order taking the name of Saint Francis' childlike companion, Brother Juniper. Until he was 35, he spent most of his time in the classroom—first as a student of theology and then as a professor. He also became famous for his preaching. Suddenly, he gave it all up and followed the yearning that had begun years before when he heard about the missionary work of Saint Francis Solano in South America. Junipero's desire was to convert native peoples in the New World.

Arriving by ship at Vera Cruz, Mexico, he and a companion walked the 250 miles to Mexico City. On the way, Junipero's left leg became infected by an insect bite and would remain a cross—sometimes life-threatening—for the rest of his life. For 18 years, he worked in central Mexico and in the Baja Peninsula. He became president of the missions there.

José de Galvez persuaded Junipero to set out with him for present-day Monterey, California. The first mission founded after the 900-mile journey north was San Diego in 1769. Other missions followed: Monterey/Carmel (1770); San Antonio and San Gabriel (1771); San Luís Obispo (1772); San Francisco and San Juan Capistrano (1776); Santa Clara (1777); San Buenaventura (1782). Twelve more were founded after Serra's death.

Junipero's missionary life was a long battle with cold and hunger, with unsympathetic military commanders and even with danger of death from non-Christian native peoples. Through it all, his unquenchable zeal was fed by prayer each night, often from midnight till dawn. He baptized over 6,000 people and confirmed 5,000.

St. Francis was special to me since I attended Franciscan University of Steubenville...and, I hate bees so I pray to him whenever I come across one. I love St. Jude for times when life seems hopeless or I'm not sure what the next step in life is for me. St. Rose of Lima holds a special place in my heart because as a young child, I was diagnosed with dyslexia, and learning how to read was difficult for me. I read a story of how the angels taught St. Rose how to read, so I began to pray to her for help. St. Catherine of Siena had the strength to do God's will to the fullest and lived it out completely. St. Pope John Paul II loved kids and is amazing; I pray to him to grow in inspiration and virtue in my job and to intercede for all my kids in youth ministry.




