FR. ERIC'S RAMBLINGS

Reflections on Fatima 23 of 27

September 13 and the visit of Our Lady

More and more people began to believe in the visions of Fatima. The following is a letter from Dr. Carlos De Azevedo Mendes, a law student at the time this letter is written, to his brother, most likely Fr. Candido De Azevedo



Mendes: "I talked to the pastor and then to the two little girls and the boy, questioning them separately. I first wanted to gain their trust and then, when they felt entirely at ease with me, I began to interview them. They made an extraordinary impression on me, which could truly be called sensational. I spent three hours with them, and even went to the place near the holm oak to recite the Rosary. I could not find even the smallest contradiction; they all gave the same exact account... After I left them, the pastor showed me his report and I was amazed to see that it exactly matched my inquiry."

Also, there is the testimony of a young seminarian named Canon Dr. Galamba de Oliveira of the Diocese of Leiria. He was present at the September visit from our blessed mother. He wrote, "I did not notice anything near the place, but after the apparition, I can't say the exact moment, I looked up to the sky, perhaps because someone told me to, and I saw, about a meter above the earth, a sort of luminous globe which soon began to descend towards the west and from the horizon went up again towards the sun. Before or after, but certainly on the same day, we – but I don't know if this is true of all those present – began to see a fall of rose petals or snow drops which came from above and disappeared a little way above our heads, so that we couldn't touch them." ("Fatima today the Third Millennium" by Fr. Fox)

In an interview with Maria dos Anjos, Fr. Robert Fox asked her to speak freely of all she could remember (she was in her late 80s when the interview was conducted). He recorded this conversation in his book, "Fatima is Forever." She said, "I myself saw the star once and also the falling of the flowers. They were tiny little white flowers, like flowers from the olive trees. People who had umbrellas tried to catch them, but they never did. Everybody wanted to catch them with their hands, but nobody did. They would disappear. They were always in the air. There were many flowers. I saw the raining of the flowers even better than the star. The star would come at midday. It would look like a night star. It was small. It would come and disappear in the direction of the tree. Then my doubts about Lucia telling the truth began to disappear."



Protect Ohio's Constitution from Outside Special Interest Groups, like the radical ACLU and Planned Parenthood. SAFEPARISH

The Archdiocese of Cincinnati, in keeping with its policies, has completed the five-year revision of the Decree on Child Protection. We anticipate the revised Decree will be available for download and acknowledgment on the SafeParish website on or about July 1, 2023. Each user with a SafeParish account will need to download, acknowledge to have read, and agree to abide by the requirements of the revised Decree. If this is not completed within 30 days of the promulgation of the Decree by the Archbishop, the user's SafeParish account will show as pending until the user completes the acknowledgement. Users with pending SafeParish accounts are not permitted to work or volunteer with youth until they have met all the child protection requirements and their SafeParish account is approved. Please contact your parish or school safe environment coordinator with any questions.

SAINT BONAVENTURE

Feast Day: July 15

Patron Saint of: bowel disorders

Born in Bagnoregio in 1221, Saint Bonaventure was baptized John, but received the name Bonaventure when he became a Franciscan at the age of 22. Little is known about his childhood, but we do know that his parents were Giovanni di Fidanza and Maria Ritell. It seems that his father was a physician and a man of means. While Saint Francis died about five years after the saint's birth, he is credited with healing Bonaventure as a boy of a serious illness.

Saint Bonaventure's teaching career came to a halt when the Friars elected him to serve as their General Minister. His 17 years of service were not easy, as the Order was embroiled in conflicts over the interpretation of poverty. Some friars even ended up in heresy saying that Saint Francis and his community were inaugurating the era of the Holy Spirit which was to replace Jesus, the Church, and Scripture. But because he was a man of prayer and a good administrator, Saint Bonaventure managed to structure the Order through effective legislation. But more importantly, he offered the Friars an organized spirituality based on the vision and insights of Saint Francis. Always a Franciscan at heart and a mystical writer, Bonaventure managed to unite the pastoral, practical aspects of life with the doctrines of the Church.

Shortly before he ended his service as General Minister, Pope Gregory X created him a Cardinal and appointed him bishop of Albano. But a little over a year later, while participating in the Second Council of Lyon, Saint Bonaventure died suddenly on July 15, 1274. There is a theory that he was poisoned.

Saint Bonaventure left behind a structured and renewed Franciscan Order and a body of work all of which glorifies his major love—Jesus.



Meet the Staff Fr. Isaiah Callan

My name is Fr. Isaiah "Callan," and my assignment as Our Lady of Fatima's parochial vicar begins July 1, 2023. You'll find me celebrating many daily Masses at St. Patrick in addition to weekend Masses at the various churches. I'll be living in St. Mary's rectory with Fr. Eric.

I was born in Boston and grew up in Waterbury Center, Vermont with my mom, dad and 10 siblings. My sister, Grace, and I attended Franciscan University of Steubenville. (We are triplets.) She moved to Cincinnati ahead of me, and, after I arrived, she brought me to visit the seminary. I wasn't sure with what intentionality she had it in her mind to introduce me to it, but after that the rest was history. In high school I couldn't yet pursue something like that, and put it off to the side. I had encouragement to move faster because I wanted to do something worth pursuing while in my 20s, now 30. This was a gift that I had not yet opened.

When I was first in the seminary, we were told stories that not too long ago, there were only 30 men total, and the trend was that priests would potentially (and need to) be pastor within two to three years following Ordination. And now, it's already a different culture with 80-85 seminarians enrolled. With this increase, I can now change my mentality, relish my time and learn from other pastors before being assigned in that capacity. I believe that in being a parochial vicar I will discover what it means to be a priest through the work itself; to try new things and discover how the call has deepened. Over time, I'll see how that will change me into the priest that Jesus wants me to become. Whereas the buck stops with Fr. Eric, each priest might have his own category of oversight or charism – and I'll likely be involved with young adult and youth groups and some nursing home engagement. As vicar, I'll also be involved in walking with couples through marriage prep, marriage, anointing of the sick, confessions...

The Church is a body of people, it's a person infinitely complex and diverse, but a unified being. This example sets a model for what it means to be a unified Church, but still yet to become fully integrated. Beacons of Light might be difficult because of melding several different church cultures; at times, it might not be easy, but it's not impossible. The challenge here is to embrace each one's uniqueness without division — coming to discover the joy of what it means to be one parish with the experiences of so many different people. And I look forward to being a part of it.

St. Josemaria Escriva is someone I've looked up to. I like how very practical the short, spiritual books he wrote are: "The Way," "Furrow," and "The Forge." When looking for ideas on how to implicate the principles of the faith, they give you something to think about and act upon. Aside from reading and an occasional podcast, I like to get outside and take walks to learn about people. I'd like to think I'm good with youth, I enjoy learning about people's interesting experiences. I think I am a good listener. I'm ready to meet our people and get to know them.


